SALARY CUTS IN **COUNTY OFFICES**

Commissioners Shave Off Around \$10,000.00

Change Jail Management -Sell Short Term Notes

The County Board of Commissioners has effected cuts in the county administration to become effective at once which in the run of a year will total around ten thousand dollars. Each elective office in the counthouse has been scrutinized, and salary cuts made in each department.

The sheriff's office for which the budget of last July appropriated \$13,315, is to be given \$8,200 on which to operate. The sheriff's salary instead of \$5500 will be \$4000. There will be only one office deputy at \$1800 and one field deputy, J. O. Hinton who will receive \$2400 out of which he must furnish his own car, and pay other expenses.

The office of register of deeds has had 'ts operating expense cut from \$7,300 to 5,000. The salary of the register is now \$3,300 in stead of \$4,000; that of first deputy, \$1,500 instead of \$1,800; \$1,200 instead of \$1,500.


