School Committee Answers Article

Corinth-Holders Committeemen Set Forth Reasons For Not Cutting Teachers Salaries, and Practicing Other Economies

A recent school election held in the Corinth-Holders district failed to carry, and the length of term, as a result of the failure to carry will be reduced from eight month to six months, and as a conse quence, no high school can b maintained. An article signed voters in the district published in papers in the county suggester an eight months' might be maintained if teacher salaries were cut and other ec nomies practiced. In answer the article mentioned, the scho committeemen of the Corint Holders district give reasons wh the suggestions made would no be the best policy.

The committeemen, Messrs. D R. Hocutt, C. W. Hocutt and J M. Davis, express their views at

"Sometime ago your paper, and other papers, published an article concerning our school over the signatures of Messrs. Andrew Wise, and others, containing suggestions as to how we, the committeemen, could better run the Corinth-Holders school. We know that we cannot satisfy everybody. and we think that if some of those who are not satisfied had our places that they would better understand things.

"Their first suggestion was reduce the salaries of the teachers to \$75.00 per month. We could de this but what kind of teachers would we get? They would be what we used to call third grade teachers. None, of the other schools of the county employ such teachers and we feel that our children are just as good as the children in the other districts and ought to have just as good

teachers than the law gives us and we have employed these teachers at the state salary schedule, except one with a supple ment of \$30.00 per month. No other district in this county, nor in the whole state, pays its teachschedule. Then how can we employ them at \$75.00 per month and get as good teachers for our children as the other schoo's

"Ten years ago we could get teachers for \$75.00 to \$100.00 per month, but if you remember the sorry little schools we had, we do not believe you will blame us for getting better teachers as we have done. Ten years ago, before we had consolidation on district ran the Hales, Emit, Corinth, Sandy Springs, Poplar Springs and Holders schools These schools had 460 children enrolled and made an average attendance of 325. They had no high school students, but they paid \$1020.00 above the state salary schedule for their teachers.

while we paid only \$240.00. "These six schools employed fifteen teachers to teach 325 pupils, while we employ fifteen teachers to teach 462 pupils in our graded school. Last year 80 high school pupils and 625 elementary pupils were enrolled at our school. This makes 705 pupils against 460 ten years ago. The average at school and 462 elementary, or a total of 529. The law gave us four high school teachers and fifteen


