

O^N February 10, 1830, a little company of progressive people in Petersburg, Virginia, obtained from the General Assembly of Virginia a charter for the construction of a railroad from Petersburg "to some convenient point on the North Carolina line."

When completed it reached from Petersburg to Blakely, Va., one and a half miles below the falls of the Roanoke River, a total distance of 59 miles.
