CORBETT HATCHER SCHOOL

SELMA, Route 1, Feb. 8.—Wednesday, February 5 was a very important day in the Corbett-Hatcher school as it was observed as visiting day as well as club day. Prior to this the pupils had written letters to their parents inviting them to come early and visit in their rooms before the regular club meeting. Several accepted the invitation. The primary grades had more parents represented. We hope at least every club day will be used as visiting day.

The Corbett-Hatcher pupils have shown an unusual interest in playground activities this year. The children are divided up into groups for play and a different teacher is assigned to the groups each month. In this way more games are learned and both the teacher and pupil enjoy the rotation system.

On Friday evening, February 7, the Corbett-Hatcher pupils engaged in a recitation and declamation contest. There were about sixteen contestants. No prize had been offered, but the contest served only to give extra practice in public speaking preparatory to the annual contest in the spring. The judges decided in favor of Mary Grant Bailey as having the best recitation and Robert Bailey the best declamation.

Our school is planning to observe "Live-at-Home" week. Mr. J. Paul Shaw who is head of the department of agriculture at the Benson high school will deliver an address to the patrons of the school on Thursday evening February 13 at 7:30. We hope the meeting will be well attended.

A new idea is now being launched in the lunch room and a proving very beneficial. Pupils are allowed to bring things from home to be used in making hot chocolate, and the club girls from the sixth and seventh grades prepare it for them. An extra charge of one-half cent in the made when the school furnishes the cocoa. Those who do not have milk are encouraged to bring the sugar and a penny can make arrangements with someone who does have milk to bring enough for both of them. In this way, all may be served. In cases where pupils prefer to bring eggs instead of money, one egg is accepted as payment for cocoa in four cups. Since so many are availing themselves of this opportunity each room is given only one day out of every week for this special lunch supplement while the regular foods may be secured any day.
