TREES When Admiral Byrd's returning explorers reached New Zealand, the sight which stirred them most deeply was trees. For nearly two years they had not seen a tree. It is difficult for most of us to imagine a world without trees, though in Iceland a hundred generations have lived and died without ever seeing one. We are cutting down trees faster than we are planting new ones. We do not think of trees as a crop, but as a natural resource to be mined without replacement. The Federal farm board's chairman lately made a plea for the restoration of the "woodlot" as an important part of every farm. Trees as a crop do pay! They take longer from seed to market than any other crop, but every sound tree adds its little to the value of any farm, and with the inevitable reduction in acreage devoted to money crops and pasturage there is no better use to which surplus land can be put than growing trees for the future. Moreover, many states now exempt reforested land from taxation.—Frank Parker Stockbridge.
