FEES OF THE CLERKS

Of the County and Superior Courts, and of the Sheriffs, of North-Carolina, as fixed by Act of General Assembly, session of 1829-30.

Price 25 cents each. - The following paragraph is extracted from the above act:

"XV. And be it further enacted, That it shall be the duty of the Clerks of the County and Superior Courts to keep a copy of spicuous place during the sitting of each Court, under a penalty of fifty dollars, to be recovered before any justice of the peace by any person suing for the same."
