## Domestic.

## New-Hampshire.-The New-

 Hampshire Patriot states that Mr. Harvey is elected by more than 4000 majority of all the votes given for Governor; four of the five Counsellors, elected, are republicans; and nine of the twelve Senators are also republicans. The Representatives will stand about 145 republicans to 90 federalits.On the result of this election, he New-York Courier remarks that the strong ground assumed by the opposition, at the onset to the present upright and democratic administration, had been fixed upon "removals from office." In the recent contest in New-Hampshire, a case was completely made up on this particular ground, and a verdict-a triumphant verdicthas been returned in favor of the President's conduct. The coalition selected Mr. Upham, who had just been removed from the Collectorship of Portsmouth. They asserted that this removal was one of the most flagrant violations of law that ever was perpetratedthat it was a manifest proscrip-tion-a monstrous act of tyranny, \&c. Under this flag they entered the field against Matthey Harvey, the Jackson demoratic candidate. The whole contest. was decided on the principle of removal from office, and the people after a full and active inquiry nto the merits of the case, have decided by an increased majority over that of last year, that the President's conduct was just and proper and right.

Removals.-The National Intelligincer of the 20th ult. says: Within the two days past, a number of nominations of subordinate civil officers, and consuls abroad, are understood to have been confirmed. Without yielding the question, as to the right of the Exccutive to create vacancies in office for the purpose of making appointments, it seems to have been conceived, by a majority of the Senate, that the exercise of the authority is one which should, for the present, be left to the constitutional responsibility of the Executive. Many such appointments have therefore been confirmed.

Tea and Coffee.- A corres pondent of the New-York Evening Post, writing from Washing ton under date 13 th ult. says:"Contrary to my first impression, that nothing would be done with the Tariff during the present session, I now think that the duties on tea and coffee will be reduced independently of other articles.

Louisiana.-The quantity of sugar and molasses produced in Louisiana in 1829, amounted to $86,000,000$; that of cotton, to about $\$ 2,000,000$.

New-Jcrsey.-The Legislature of New-Jersey have passed a bill to prevent the circulation of Bank paper of other States, of a less denomination than $\$ 5$, after the 4th of July next. They have also abolished military trainings, save one day in the year, and doubled the fine for non-attendance on that day. We hope our Legislature will soon follow their example.
