Packing Screws, Horse Mills, Chain Bands and Still Repairing.

Cotton Gins,

Of good materials, part of which will be steel saws and the ribs or bars faced with steel—the large Gins will be double framed, two seed boards bearing in the middle, and double cushioned, to answer the purpose of two 40 saw Gins.

Packing Screws,

Of the usual size, and larger than any now in use in the State, and no doubt superior—they will be made in an engine erected for that purpose, which cannot fail to cut the screws more accurately than those which are made by hand or other ordinary means—the thread will be a square or v, or any other to please the purchaser.

Horse Mills,
