FOR CONGRESSMAN AT-LARGE:
HON. R. T. BENNETT,
OF ANSON.

In declining the "Liberal" nomination for Judge, that true and staunch Democrat, Mr. J. A. Long, nobly said: "I do not propose to board the vessel of the enemy in order to try to scuttle my own ship. I do propose to stay on board and help beat back the assaults of the enemy, and if the ship goes down, I propose to go down with the ship."

The Radicals are continually showing their disregard for law and order. The sub-committee on elections, has reported in favor of selecting Mr. Tillman of South Carolina and putting in the negro Snalls, although by the official returns, Mr. Tillman received 23,375 votes, while Snalls only got 13,287. This wiping out of over eight thousand majority is a piece of villainy that only the Radical party would be guilty of.

The "Liberal movement" is the wedge the Republicans propose to split the solid South with. They turned Chalmers of Mississippi out and gave his seat to a negro. Chalmers went home under the impression his Democratic friends did not stand up to him as they ought to have done, and has announced himself as an "independent," "liberal" candidate, and these same Republicans are now joining him. How they propose to work may be seen from the following from the N. Y. Star: "Chalmers now has the active sympathy of his late aversors. The district is Democratic, and no Republican has a chance there. What is the extent of the understanding between the Republicans and Chalmers can be inferred from the fact that aid and comfort of the most substantial kind are sought from Jay Hubbell's committee, which stands ready to take by the hand and give similar encouragement to bolters from the Democrats wherever there is a chance for them to beat the regular nominees. It is argued that four out of five of the Democrats thus elected will become auxiliaries of the Republicans, help them organize Congress, and finally land in the bosom of the Republican party. This is called "inserting a wedge in the South."

WHAT is the matter with the Charlotte Observer? In his issue of Saturday last Col. Jones comes out flat-footed against the present system of county government. No man knows better than the editor of the Observer that the present plan was adopted to save thirty of the best counties of North Carolina from negro spoliation, yet he now favors the Republican idea of upsetting this plan. He says "the introduction of the question into the political canvass about to be initiated is a Republican ruse," and yet he favors it. He says "I have submitted to it in years past as a matter of party expediency, but the system is undemocratic and cannot be defended upon any principle of justice or right." If he "submitted" then, we would like to ask in all candor why he fails to "submit" now when the "expediency" is greater than ever. He says "we have always been willing to bow to the decrees of our party conventions, as long as they are right." If the system is wrong now, it certainly was when he "submitted" for party expediency.

He says "in this section of the State it will be found that there are many persons who have heretofore cooperated with the Democratic party whose idea of county government are based upon the Jeffersonian ideas, &c. Does "heretofore" mean that they will not now? Col. Jones has been always a true, zealous and working Democrat, and while we regret his position on the county government question, it is a matter Democrats can discuss without questioning party fealty. But this is not all that we find in the article. The paragraph quoted below is, to say the least, mysterious, and we call his attention to it that he may put the right construction upon it. We would spurn the idea that the editor of the Charlotte Observer is puffing the "liberal" breeze, and yet the following, in which he is alluding to the Democratic party, sounds strange from a leading Democratic editor: "We cannot foretell just what party disruptions are before us in the near future, but we can predict that the party which contends itself by being conducted by rings and cliques within, and disavowed by the people it wishes without, will find before long that the people will be heard, and that their utterances cannot be disregarded."

We knew that Dr. Mott felt certain of his game when he arranged the ticket for the side he had just won, and that he was confident that the different conventions would receive his edict in submission and conform their action to his will. It appears that he did not reckon with his own power. The conventions obeyed his commands and endorsed his programme. The ticket was yesterday voted on as a unit, without question. If there was any dissent from a pill of obedience it was drowned in the furor of applause. The manager was vindicated. But the ticket is now to be passed on at the polls—and what if Mr. Dockery is well known—and so are the other endorsed candidates. They make together as weak a ticket as the Republicans could well have put out. It has no particular elements of popularity. —Naves and Observer.

The "Liberal" Convention.

The nominees for Congressman-at-large is Oliver H. Dockery, one of the most stalwart republicans in the South, and whose nomination was ratified by the Republican State convention yesterday, in accordance with the previously arranged programme. When the democratic convention, that meets on the 3th of July, nominates Judge Bennett, or some other anti-prohibitionist (as will be done), no anti-prohibitionist democrat can have any excuse for voting for the republican candidate, for Dockery is, of course, the republican candidate, and his election would be a republican victory. The nomination of Col. Folk for Supreme Court Judge was thrown out as a snare to entrap some disgruntled democrats.

Quite extreme in his views, and was the Confederate officer who hunted deserters in this and Randolph counties during the late war, and whose men took Bill (now a Randolph county deserter) out of the jail at this place and shot him to death without any trial whatsoever. Of course, however, this fact would not hinder any good Union republican from voting for Col. Folk against the regular democratic candidate. This ticket of Folk and Dockery is a hybrid affair.
