Fire at Chapel Hill. Thursday night about 11:30 o'clock a fire alarm was turned in by the vigorous ringing of the college bell. In answer to the call people rushed out of their rooms to find that the University Dissecting hall was on fire.

The blaze is thought to have started from a small fire which had been burning near the building during the day. This had been used in boiling bones in preparation for the medical course next year.

The loss of the University is estimated at about \$3,000, the building being valued at about \$2,000 and the bodies intended for dissection at about \$1,000. The building carried no insurance.
