DEMOCRATIC COUNTY PRIMARY AUGUST 8TH

Primary to be held under the Legalized Primary Law - Rules and Regulations - Pollholders.

The Democratic County Executive Committee, composed of the chairmen of the various precincts, met here Friday and was presided over by the recently elected chairman, Professor D. A. McGregor.

After some discussion, it was decided to hold the election for nomination of county officers under the recently enacted primary law.

A motion was introduced and strongly advocated by Mr. Lockhart and others to allow no person to take part in the primary who would not pledge himself to support the nominees.

A petition containing 162 names was presented to the board, signed by the citizens mostly of Lanesboro No. 2, asking that the people be allowed to vote for the county superintendent of education and also for the board of education.

It was decided to eliminate the clause of the laws under which the primaries are usually held, which allows other candidates receiving within 25 votes of the highest number cast for another candidate, the privilege of running in the second primary.

That the Democratic county executive committee shall appoint the day and the hour at which the polls shall be opened and closed in each township; appoint a poll holder for each county officer to be elected in November next; also for justices of the peace and constables in each township.

All persons who voted the Democratic ticket in the general election, all persons who have arrived at the legal age for voting since the last election, or will be of voting age at the ensuing election, or have become residents of the county since the last election, or such white men who since the last election have become Democrats and will be legally qualified to vote in the coming general election.
