its report to the Superior Court
last week, it advised that the
County Home be made more
comfortable, and that better
bedding be used for the inmates.
We hope that those in charge of
this institution will make these
necessary improvements before
cold weather comes again.

We are sure the decision
reached in the impeachment
trial will bring about a better
feeling in political circles, and
as one of the first fruits of this
action on the part of the Sen-
ate, we understand that one of
the counsel for the prosecution
of Democratic Registrars has
said: That he would not be a
party to the continuance of
those cases, and would do all he
could to not prosecute every in-
dictment against them.

It is the province of the edi-
tor of the town paper, not
only to encourage new enter-
prises, and to furnish the peo-
ple with the news, but, also to
commend the right and to con-
demn the wrong and acting in
view of these premises; we de-
sire to call the attention of our
town authorities to the desecra-
tion of the Sabbath day, by a
crowd of thoughtless young
men who after nightfall went
about the town singing songs,
firing pistols and in at least one
instance destroying property by
tearing down fences.

We are sure the young men
did not realize that they were
doing, or they would not have
acted as they did around one
home where loving parents were
watching over a sick, and they
feared, a dying child. Our
young men are good hearted
boys, who would not willingly
hurt anyone, but they ought to
be more thoughtful.

Young men, remember the
reputation of the town is in
your hands — what will you
make it? Let's pull together
and give our town the best
name for all that is good.

in explaining their votes to their
constituents in time to come,
we are still hoping that the
matter is over we hope har-
mony will prevail and that
North Carolina will progress
as she has never progressed
before, and that the Supreme
Court, as well as the people,
will learn a lesson from the
recent trial.

WASHINGTON LETTER

(From our regular correspondent.)

April 1st, 1901.

Fred Funston is now a Brig-
adier General in the regular army,
thanks to the action of the Presi-
dent. It is not creditable to army
officers to be trying to be little
such acts as Funston's cap-
ture of Aguinaldo, because of their
opposition to a volunteer officer
being made a Brigadier General
in the regular army, which was
the only military reward the Presi-
dent could give Funston, the new
Army law specifically stating
that no volunteer officer should be
given a commission in the regular
army between that of Lieutenant
and Brigadier-General.

The President promptly ap-
pointed Funston a Brigadier Gen-
eral, regardless of the opposition of army
officers and their friends. Funston's
admirers rejoice that he did so at
once, as they know that the army
ring can wield a powerful influence
and they feared if given time en-
ough to get concentrated upon the
President, it might have succeeded
in preventing the appointment.
This fight against Funston, which
may be carried into the U. S. Sen-
ate to try to prevent the confirma-
tion of his nomination, is merely a
revival of the old fight of the
West-Pointers against the out-
siders, which has been going on for
many years. The headquarters of
the West-Pointers may be said to
be in Adjutant-General Corbin's
office, at the War Department, al-
though he is not a West Pointer
himself. Gen. Corbin is a man of
undoubted ability, but is a well-
known fact that he is now a Major
General, more through political
and petticoat influences exerted
under various administrations than
because of his military service or
accomplishments. It is regarded
as Corbin's influence that pre-
vented Sec'y Root's sending congratu-
lations to either McArthur or Fun-
ston on the capture of Aguinaldo,
until after Sec'y Long had congrat-
ulated both officers in his cablegram
to Admiral-Remey, as well as
thanked them for their praise of
the Navy for its assistance. Sec'y
Root and Gen. Corbin would better
be very careful unless they wish to
become very unpopular. The pub-
lic does not care a rap about rival-
ry between West Pointers and
outsiders in the army, but it ad-
mires bravery and daring and de-
sires may, demands that it shall be
rewarded wherever found. Senator
Burton voiced public opinion, when
he said, just after urging the Presi-
dent to announce Funston's ap-
pointment to be Brigadier Gen-
eral: "Funston has the quality of
ability that gets there." It doesn't
make any difference how he does
it, but he gets there. Whether it
is by beating the Filipinos at their
own tricks, or swimming streams,
or just plain hard hand to hand
fighting. We expected to have him
made a Brigadier General in the
regular army. That was certainly
not too much to ask as a reward
for such an exploit."

Officials expect that the capture
of Aguinaldo, and the surrender
of the other Filipino officers and
men will make it unnecessary to
keep as large an army in the Phil-
ippines as was planned for when
Congress passed the Army bill, and
if reports from Gen. MacArthur
and the Philippine Commission, bear
out those expectations, orders

are likely to be issued limiting the
number of men to be recruited un-
der the law, which provides for a
regular army of 100,000. What
limit will be, will, of course, depend
upon future reports.

It is regarded as certain that the
President will appoint musician,
Olivia P. Titus, Company E, In-
fantry, a cadet at West Point, for
conspicuous bravery in China. The
following position, signed by every
officer serving with the Fourteenth
has been received at the War De-
partment: "During his service Musi-
cician Titus has proven himself to
be a trustworthy, intelligent, sober,
brave and thorough soldier. On
August, 14th, 1900, at Peking China,
he was the first American to scale
the wall of the Chinese city and
enter Peking. On the following day,
while engaged in the fight in the
Imperial city, he received a slight
wound. His meritorious conduct
deserves recognition, and it is be-
lieved that it given an appoint-
ment to West Point and a Com-
mission upon graduation, Musician
Titus will make an excellent officer.

Senator Platt, of Conn., author
of the terms for withdrawing from
Cuba, said of those terms: "Some
people, both here and in Cuba, as-
sert that we seek to establish a
protectorate, but this is entirely a
misapprehension. The acceptance of
the terms will not establish a pro-
tectorate in any sense that the
word has ever been used in inter-
national law. The situation is
unique, and there is nothing between
Cuba and Cuba will be unique and may
be properly expressed by saying
that the U. S. desires to become
the guarantor of Cuban indepen-
dence, and the stability of its gov-
ernment. The right of interven-
tion, which we insist upon, is only
to be exercised to that end, and only
when necessary for that purpose.
It will not authorize any inter-
ference on the part of our government
in Cuban affairs, unless circum-
stances arise which require that we
should act to preserve their inde-
pendence, or insure tranquility,
and such a step could only be tak-
en as the result of deliberate action
by Congress. The Cuban republic
will be comparatively weak and
unable by itself to cope with prob-
lems very likely to arise both as to
its foreign policy and domestic con-
ditions. It may need the assistance
of the U. S. and instead of resent-
ing the willingness of the U. S. to
assist it, it ought to be thankful
that it has so powerful a friend."
