AN ACCIDENT.

Sam Gurganus was the last to jump, and the train was moving pretty rapidly and threw him. He struck on his head making very ugly places just over the right eye and another over the chin. For several minutes he was com letel dazed.

He was carried home by Mr. Sutton. His injuries are not serious. This should be sufficient warning to all boys against jumping on and off the trains.

[TO PARENTS: I have been requested by the agent of the R. R. Company to say that a great favor will be conferred on him as well as the R. R. Co if their boys are kept from jumping the trains. There is a law prohibiting any person under 21 years old, other than employes and passengers, from getting on and off the trains (See Ord. 25 town laws) and that it will be necessary to enforce this law not only in justice to the R. R. Co. but those who violate it.—Ed.]

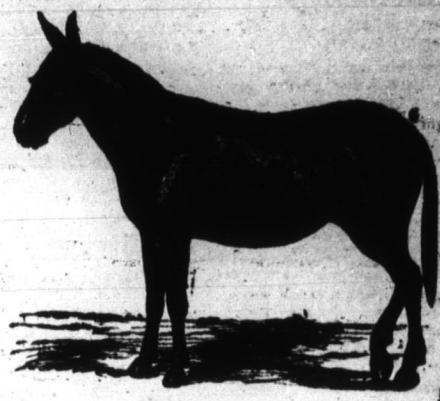
