WASHINGTON LETTER

Feb. 3, 1902.

The president says that the Cubans must be given a tariff concession of at least 25 per cent on their sugar, the beet sugar men say that a concession of more than 10 per cent on Cuban sugar will mean ruin to them. This is the status of the matter today. It is as certain as anything not yet accomplished can be that Cuban sugar will get a tariff concession, notwithstanding the stories that the bill for the repeal of all the war taxes, which was today reported to the House from the Ways and Means committee, is put forward to prevent Cuban tariff concession by reducing the revenues of the government to such an extent that the full duty on Cuban sugar will be needed, although the extent of the concession is yet to be determined, and the chances are that the concession will be the amount stated by the President or very close to it.

The chairman of the Ways and Means committee denies that the reporting of the bill for the repeal of war taxes, which will be called up as soon as the Oleomargarine bill, which has the right of way in the House, is disposed of, had any connection whatever with the question of Cuban tariff concessions. Nobody expects the hearings now going on before the Senate committee on Inter-oceanic canals to bring out any new facts about the Isthmian canal question or to change any Senator's mind that has already been made up. It is merely a case of sparring for wind. The members of the committee wish to ascertain what can be done before they attempt to do anything and they hope to emphasize some facts during the hearing that will enable them to size up the actual position of some Senators who are constantly talking canal and acting in a way to prevent canal legislation. Senator Morgan also hopes to make it plain that the Panama Canal Company cannot give a valid title to what they are asking \$40,000,000 for. The President is doing all he can to secure canal legislation, although careful not to advocate any route.

There has been more or less comment in Washington upon an order issued to army officers who have the handling of Cuban

After notifying the officers to furnish without delay such explanations as may be asked for by the Auditor of Cuba, the order says: "No officer will be permitted to leave the island until his accounts are settled, and in order to avoid an unnecessary stay in the island after the military government is turned over to the Cuban government a strict compliance with these orders is directed."

The President's order forbidding any civil employe of the government either individually or through associations, to solicit an increase of pay or to seek to influence legislation before Congress or any of its committees, under penalty of dismissal, will not be pleasing to letter carriers and other postal employes who have bills pending before Congress for the increase of their salaries. In fact, there is no doubt that the order was aimed at the postal employes who have for some time been seeking an increase in their salaries. While there may be some doubt as to the President's right to issue an order depriving employes of the government of any rights given citizens by the Constitution, there is absolutely none of his right to dismiss government employes, consequently the order is likely to be obeyed without question by the employes, although it may serve as a text for a few speeches in Congress.

It is not hard to say that the average Congressman has heart opposed to the civil service law, but afraid to openly advocate its repeal. But the ease with which any opportunity to hit that law in an indirect way is embraced, by them proves the truth of the assertion. The bill establishing a permanent Census Bureau and placing some two thousand employes who never took a civil service examination on the same footing with those who got into the government service by passing a civil service examination, which passed the house by the votes of both parties—every man who voted for it had points to look out for—is a case in point. It is a fine thing for the two thousand census employes who will get into the classified civil service, but it is unfair to exactly the same number of persons throughout the country who would have received appointments by passing a civil service examination, and it is a plain evasion of the civil service law.

So far three members of the Senate have shown the moral courage to openly advocate increasing the salaries of Senators and Representatives to \$7,500. They are Hoar, of Mass., whose bill increasing the salaries of all Federal judges about one third, which is now before the Senate, had a clause providing for the increase in Congressional salaries when it was introduced, but it was struck out by the Judiciary committee before the bill was reported to the Senate; Hawley, of Conn., and Stewart of Nevada, who has given notice of his intention to offer an amendment for the increase in Congressional salaries.

A record vote upon that amendment might interest the country. Judge Wm. H. Taft, the civil governor of the Philippines in its investigation did not give very interesting testimony, for the very simple reason that about everything he told the committee. I had already been told months ago by the press dispatches. Doubtless he could "scoop" the newspapers a few times, if so disposed, but he hasn't the disposition yet.

Investigations are getting plentiful. Senator Rawlins succeeded in getting the Senate to adopt a resolution directing the committee on Indian affairs to investigate the leasing of mineral land by Indians and the power of the Secretary of the Interior to approve such leases.
