His most important invention was a plough. Mr. Bacon, his overseer, says: "He was very ingenious. He invented a plow that was considered a great improvement on any that had ever been used. He got a great many premiums and medals for it. He planued his own carriage, buildings; garden and fences, and many other things. He was nearly always busy upon some plan or model."

Jefferson's plough received a gold nedal in France in 1790. During his European tours he had beer struck with the waste of power caused by the bad construction of the ploughs in common use.
