TABLES TURNED

After an Interval of One Week Chocowinity Gets Even with Our Baseball Team by Defeating It—6 to 4

One week ago last Monday the baseball team from Trinity School, Chocowinity, came here and lost a game to our boys by a score of 7 to 13. After that game the team from Trinity asked for a return game on their grounds. In answer to this request our boys left here last Monday morning at about 4:30 o'clock in a wagon enroute to Chocowinity.

On the arrival of the team at the school at 10:30 o'clock the Trinity boys took them in charge as their guests. Our boys report having a "jolly good time" and ask no better hosts than the members of the Trinity baseball team.

The game was called at 4:00 o'clock with the Trinity boys in the field. Neither side scored during the first inning, but in the second one of the Williamston boys made the circuit for a run. Ade Mizell, who was to have pitched the first inning and was compelled to retire from the game. M. Short, a Washington pitcher, was asked to do the twirling for our boys during the balance of the game, which he consented to do. Short pitched a fine game, striking out ten batters, and allowing only two safe hits; he also made one of the six hits and one of the four runs scored by Williamston.

There were no more runs scored until the fourth inning when two runs were added to the Williamston score. The next runs were made in the seventh when our boys made one more run and Trinity made three, the first they had scored.

The score remained 4 to 3 in favor of Williamston until the last half of the ninth inning. Two of the Trinity men had been put out and one was on first base and one on third when Hill stepped to the bat and sent a fly to centre. It looked blue for Trinity, but centre muffed the ball, the man on third scoring, making the score a tie. Henry then faced the pitcher and sent one to centre as the man before him with the same result—another run. Jaycox then came to the bat and placed a fly in the same part of the field—centre once more failed to connect and let in one run, making the score 6 to 4 in favor of Trinity. Goddard then took the "stick" but Short fooled him and he "fanned the wind." Thus endeth the tale of the downfall of the Williamston baseball club at Chocowinity on Monday, May 25th.
