OF INTEREST TO MANY.

We call the attention of dog owners to Ordinance 51 which read as follows:

Ord. LI. On each dog within the corporate limits there shall be a tax of one dollar, for which a tag, "Tax Paid," shall be issued by the Mayor. Each dog within the corporate limits after July 1st not having on such tag shall be impounded, and after three days killed, unless the owner shall pay double tax and fifty-cent costs.

Raleigh Letter.

June 15th, 1903.

"Jim Wilcox the murderer of Nellie Crosby is at last safely landed in the State penitentiary here for 20 years. The Supreme Court last Thursday decided his appeal against him, whereupon the Pasquotank county authorities brought him to the State's prison—probably for life—and this is the final act in one of the hardest fought criminal cases that has figured in the courts and state books of North Carolina."

OUR NEXT GOVERNOR AND LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR.

Within twelve months the next Governor of North Carolina will be practically named, and yet we have heard and read very little discussion of the subject, so far. Who will it be?

As it is more than probable that the Democratic nominee will be a "western man" this time, I have been looking into the matter lately and, judging by the expressions of scores of representative citizens of the west I find that Lieutenant Governor Wilfred D. Turner of Irrell and ex-Lieutenant Governor Charles M. Steadman of Guilford, are the two most talked of gentlemen for the position up to this time—and either of them would make us a splendid Chief Magistrate. But others have their friends also, of course, and not infrequently you will meet up with those who champion Col. John S. Cuningham of Person, Hon. R. B. Glenn of Forsyth, Hon. Thos. F. Davidson of Iredell et al. It seems to be understood that Gen. Julian S. Carr and Hon. Cy. B. Watson will not enter the race.

For Lieutenant Governor an eastern man will be named, if the usual course is pursued, and there are two men who seem to stand head and shoulders above all others, so far, for this honor—two of our leading State Senators, viz., Hon. J. E. Woodard of Wilson and Hon. Joseph A. Brown of Columbus (the latter being the present President of the Senate)—and there is no better material in the State. Indeed, either of them is highly qualified and would make a first-class Governor of North Carolina, if the mantle of that office should fall upon his intellectually broad and patriotic shoulders.

State Teachers Meet.

Prof. R. J. Peel who represented this section at the State Teacher's Association Convention at Wrightsville Beach reports a well-attended and enthusiastic meeting. There were about 250 present as delegates and the meetings were filled with thoughtful suggestions for the advancement of the educational movement in the State. Most of those participating were from the higher schools and from the graded schools.

One day was given up to the County Superintendents, and Prof. Peel reports that much interest was manifested by those present, and that this meeting was productive of much good in the way of seed planting for future development. This meeting was presided over by Prof. J. V. Joyner, State Superintendent.

The convention was addressed by many able men among whom was the President of the State University, F. P. Venable, and President McKesson, of the State Normal at Greensboro. Hon. J. H. Small was expected to be present and address the Association but sickness at his home prevented him from so doing. Prof. J. B. Carley, of Wake Forest, was elected President of the Association, Mr. Venable declining to serve again.


