WASHINGTON LETTER

The people here who are so confidently predicting the confirmation of General Leonard Wood as Major General, either are blind partisans of his and can see nothing detrimental to him and his interests, or reveal amazing credulity or else have a wonderful foreknowledge of coming events.

Without taking into consideration the scandal concerning the Jai-Alai franchise and the exorbitant prices paid in Havana for granite to a firm composed of Wood's relatives, condone the attacks made by him upon Generals Brooke and Dudley, overlook entirely his connection with the ex-convict "Bel-lair," and still the main question remains untouched.

General Wood may be a good pill peddler. He showed some administrative ability in Cuba. But as a field commander his experience is limited to a few days in a subordinate capacity in Cuba and to his recent "campaign" against the Moros, who were "flushed" defenceless to his guns like birds at a battue, apparently that he might make a "bag" to impress the Senate.

The recent visit of Senator Hanna to the White House at the invitation of the President, and the two hours' conference between the two, has caused much comment here concerning the relations existing between the two, and the possibility of a break in the former apparently cordial feeling.
