The Status of the Graded School That those who are generally interested in the Williamston Graded School may form some idea of the plan upon which the school is operated, we give a brief outline of its main features:

THE GRADES Although the curriculum of the school provides for nine years consecutive work, material was found at the beginning for the formation of only seven grades. The children in these seven grades may continue in their course being promoted each year, by passing satisfactory examinations, to the next highest grade, until the ninth is completed. Certificates of graduation will be awarded to those accomplishing the full course.

In the primary grade, under the charge of Miss Marina Whitley, the children are drilled in the letters and sounds (the Phonic method) also in the use of numbers. In the second and the third grades, under Miss Nelle Simpson, they are taught the second, third and fourth readers, the elements of geography and arithmetic and writing. The fourth and fifth grades under Miss Sallie Richardson, embrace more comprehensive work in reading, arithmetic, geography, spelling, grammar and history. The sixth grade, under its Principal, introduces the pupils to Algebra, Latin, higher arithmetic and reviews grammar, history, etc. The work of the sixth grade is expanded in the seventh. In the eighth and ninth grades will be taught the higher branches of science, art and literature.

THE SESSIONS The school year is divided into two terms of four months each. At the end of each of the sessions written examinations will be held, an average of 75 per cent. on which will entitle to promotion in the grades. Children failing to obtain the promotion marks will be required to take the same work over until they get credit for same. The intermediate examinations will be held the first week in February.

REGULATIONS. Rules have been formed for the Graded School regarding attendance, the preparation of lessons, tardiness, truant playing, defacement of property, profanity, and the general conduct of the pupils. These regulations are not too rigid, though they have been thoroughly impressed on the pupils, and a strict observance of them is required.

A course of ten grades in music is conducted by Miss Jennie Moore, though this is apart from the public school, and a tuition fee is charged monthly.

CONFIRMATION

Bishop Capers at the Church of the Advent

Bishop Ellison Capers, of South Carolina, who is assisting in the work of the Diocese of East Carolina, made a visitation to this Parish on Tuesday evening, the 19th instant at which time the Rite of Confirmation was administered.

Bishop Capers is a man of fine presence, an ex-Confederate general and one of the most eminent divines in the South. He sustained his reputation as an orator and the deep earnestness of his manner impressed the most careless listener. He has a soft, clear voice with intonation so perfect that not one syllable was lost to his hearers.

He chose for his text Matt. 22: 21: "Render therefore unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and unto God the things which are God's," and drew from this answer of the man of Galilee to the wicked Herodians and Pharisees the lesson of man's duty to Society and his duty to the God who divinely ordained that Society. In plain, simple language he depicted the highest and truest type of patriotism—love of country indissolubly linked with love of God. He appealed especially to the young and gave them the important truth that to be a loyal citizen a man must in his daily life and character be moral. The discourse was in its entirety a powerful one, both helpful and instructive to the adult and child.

The Parish, which deploring the circumstance which made Bishop Capers' visit necessary, was much pleased at his coming and will always welcome him gladly, for the message he bears from God our Father.
