ANOTHER RECEIVERSHIP

John P. Culver, of New Jersey, has fieled a petition before Judge Purnell, of the Federal Court, for the appointment of a receiver of the Atlantic and North Carolina railroad. Judge Purnell has set the 21st of May the time for the hearing where in the railroad may show cause why a receiver should not be appointed. This time we believe that Cuyler is a genuine stockholder, having 37 shares in the railroad, but in consideration of the fact that the investigating committee appointed by Governor Aycock are at work in the case, it seems rather precipitate to ask for receivers before the committee makes a report. The road seems to be attracting much attention, and it is hoped that the various features of the agitation will inure to the benefit of the State and the private stockholders. - Scotland Neck Commonwealth.


