SUMMER DRINKS.

How to Make Some Refreshing and Refreshing Beverages.

Alcoholic drinks should be avoided at all times, but especially in the summer, and the water is almost or altogether. Lemon juice in water is healthful and refreshing, but for those who want something more tasty the following are recommended by a writer in What to Eat:

Raspberry Cup.—Mash a quart each of raspberries and currants with a wooden spoon. Add one pound of sugar and a quart of water. Bring slowly to the boiling point and allow to boil for ten minutes. Strain through a jelly bag, allow to cool, chill on ice and serve. Add more sugar if not sweet enough.

Fruit Beverage.—Put the yellow rind of twelve lemons very thin, squeeze the juice over the peel and allow to stand for twelve hours. Mash one quart of ripe raspberries with a half pound of sugar; pare a ripe pineapple, slice and chop very fine and mix with another half pound of sugar. Let stand for several hours. Then strain the lemon juice and mash the raspberries through a coarse sieve, then the pineapple and mix all together, adding three quarts of cold water. Mix until the mixture is entirely dissolved, then strain, chill and serve in glasses with a slice of pineapple, one of lemon and a few raspberries in each.

Fruit Cup.—Mix together the juice of half a lemon, one tablespoonful each of lime and pineapple juice, four ounces of sugar and two ounces of shaved ice. Fill up the glass with rich milk, shake until foamy and drink at once.

Pineapple Nectar.—Pare and core a fine, ripe pineapple and grate on a coarse grater. Add to each pint of pulp half a pint of water. Press through a sieve, and add to every quart a pound of sugar boiled to a syrup with one cupful of water. Cool and the whipped white of an egg, beat thoroughly for a few minutes and place on ice until time to serve.

Black Currant Cup.—To one quart of weak green tea add one cupful of black currant juice. Strain to clear and chill thoroughly before serving.

Grape Sherbet.—Crush the grapes, put them in a stone jar and cover with good white vinegar. Then cover the jar tightly. Press and strain the grapes thoroughly, allowing them to stand for three days. Then strain two or three times through a fine muslin, and to every three quarts of juice add five pounds of sugar. Stir until the sugar is all dissolved, let come to a boil, strain carefully and bottle while hot.

Strawberry Lemonade.—Pare, core and slice a large, ripe pineapple; add the strained juice of four lemons and a cupful made of boiling water for five minutes four cupfuls of sugar and two cupfuls of water. When cold add one quart of water; strain and ice.

How to Sterilize Milk.

Fill small washed half pint bottles to within one and one-half inches of the top with milk; cork with sterilized cotton. Stand in a steamer of cold water, having water around bottles to three-fourths their height. Allow water to heat gradually and keep nearly to the boiling point and keep at this temperature for ten minutes. When cool for instant use, allow from a teaspoonful to a tablespoonful of lye-water for each bottle of milk.

How to Treat Severe Wounds.

Every little while we read in the paper that some one has run a rusty nail in his hand or foot or other portion of his body and loathaw resulted therefrom and that the patient died. If every person was aware of a perfect remedy for such wounds and would apply it, then such reports would cease, says the Gazette (Ore.) Gem. The remedy is simple, always at hand, can be applied by any one—what is better, is infallible. It is simply to smoke the wound, or any wound that is bruised or inflamed, with a wooden stick. Twenty minutes in the smoke will take the pain out of the worst case of inflammation arising from such a wound. People may smile at this remedy as much as they please, but when they are afflicted with such wounds let them try it.

How to Clean White Ribbons.

There is only one right way to do up white ribbons which have become soiled. Lay the ribbon on a table and scrub it, using water and a brush with stiff bristles. When clean rinse it under the spigot, squeezing out the water between the fingers without crossing the material and hang it over a line. When it is dry the ribbon will be free from wrinkles, fresh and new looking.

How to Whiten the Skin.

Do this if you want to look specially nice for any occasion. After washing neck, arms and shoulders sponge lightly with equal parts of glycerine and rosewater. Powder thickly without drying the skin. Leave for at least a quarter of an hour; then with your fingers rub the powder into the skin until it has entirely disappeared. It improves the appearance of the skin in a wonderful way. But remember, the powder must be washed off with warm soap and water before you go to bed, or a cup of pingpong may result.

How to Make Wholesome Cream.

Put six ounces of granulated sugar with four tablespoonfuls of water and six drops of essence of peppermint. Put into a granite container and each after stirring for a minute. As soon as it begins to boil take from the fire and pour by the spoonful into buttered paper.

How to Clean Newspaper Tablets.

To clean ivory memorandum tablets, rub lightly with a small piece of slightly dampened newspaper. This will give a good clean.

How to Make a Refreshing Sherbet.

Put salt and ginger (crushed) together in a shallow black wood pan, mix to measure one cupful. Mix them with one cupful of mashed and seasoned potatoes and one cupful of soft bread-crumbs. Stir in two well beaten eggs. Add a high seasoning of salt, pepper and onion juice, a few drops of lemon juice and three tablespoonfuls of beef stock. When cold mold into croquettes, dip each into beaten egg, roll in fine crumbs and fry in deep smoking hot oil.

REMOVAL OF STAINS.

How to Make Washable Spots on Domestic Dressings.

Butterfly, or "lapped" milk, is often used today for removing ordinary dirt or red wine stains. Leaving the fabric in milk for several hours, then washing in lukewarm water, says the Kansas City Star.

Nearly all fruit stains will disappear if boiled hot and water is poured through them. Spread the stained portion tightly over the top of a pan or tub and pour the water from the tea-kettle directly through.

For wash goods a short list of stains, with their "antidotes," runs as follows:

For fresh tea stains, cold water and soap. If old and obstinate, soak first in cold water, squeeze dry, rub with the yolk of an egg and glycerine, then wash with simple, pure soap and lukewarm water. Fresh coffee stains will come out with cold water. Old ones that have been boiled in need the same treatment as old tea stains, followed by a good bleaching on the grass.

For or fresh paint will yield to kerosene, or the article may be soaked in kerosene, then rinsed in cold water. For paint on colored cottons rub kerosene soap thoroughly on the spot, then soak in cold water overnight, when the paint will pull off, leaving no stain or injury to the fabric.

For wine stains try sprinkling thickly with salt, then pouring hot water through the fabric. If the wine is claret, a sulphur match burned under it, taking pains not to scorch the goods, will usually be efficacious. German housewives have little sulphur sticks which they keep on purpose for such stains. A better rule for removing wine stains from table linen is to cover red wine stains with white wine, and vice versa.

An iodine stain will come out if the fabric is soaked in sweet milk, with constant rubbing of the spot.

For blood stains nothing is better than cold soap-water which kerosene has been added. Machine oil or vasoline comes out easily when washed with soap and cold water.

For chocolate or cocoa stains soap thickly and rinse in warm water. To remove starch, dip in soap-water and spread in the hot sunshine. It may take days, but it will yield at last. For grass stains, soap and rub the spot in a solution of water and cream of tartar. Alcohol or kerosene is also said to be efficacious.

How to Mend Glassware.

If you happen to break a glass or valuable glass ornament it can be repaired and easily mended in the following way: Melt a little bit of resin in a spirit of wine, add a small quantity of water. Warm the mixture gently over a moderate fire. When cooled by thoroughly melting it will form a perfectly transparent glue which will unite glass or silver and firmly that the joint will scarcely be noticed by the most critical eye.

How to Strengthen the Arteries.

The question has often been asked, "Can the arteries be transplanted?" And we answer, "Yes, it can," says the National Magazine. If you have an old pine stump in your yard, so much the better; but, if not, in the fall find some isolated root and dig a large circle about it, spreading as little as possible the roots in the living, and set out in some shaded southern exposure, or better still, if you have it on some southern bank, when it will get the morning sun and the warmth but not direct glare of the afternoon sun, and my word for it, if you have been very careful in the lifting you will be greeted next spring with the dainty little beauties in your own yard.

How to Make a Jelly Strainer.

For a homemade jelly strainer place a chair, leg upturned on a stool, table or another chair. Put the basin on it and tie a clean tea cloth to the legs (one corner to each leg). See that the cloth drapes a little in the center. Pour the jelly into the cloth and allow it to trickle through. If not clear at first, repeat.

How to Make Fresh Cakes.

Put all the rind and less part from salt pork. Of the fat part chop a pound so fine that it is like lard or a nearly like that as it can be made. Into this stir a cup of boiling water, two cups of dark brown sugar, a cup of dark molasses into which a teaspoonful of baking soda has been stirred, a quarter pound of raisins and dates chopped, a quarter pound of citron shaved fine. Stir in enough sifted flour to make it of the consistency of ordinary cake batter, season with a teaspoonful each of cinnamon, cloves, allspice and nutmeg. Bake in a loaf tin in a steady oven.
