the opposing armies are lacking. The report that Kuropatkin's rear guard has been annihilated and that the Russian forces are in danger of being surrounded is denied by the Russian general staff. The Russian war office is entirely confident that the retreat is slowly but surely being effected.

From Tokio comes the official report that the bulk of the Russian forces is still at Yentai.

The Japanese field marshal in an extended report of the fighting up to September 4th, says that the Russians burned all the railroad bridges over the Taitse river and predicts that, while the Japanese list of casualties is not yet completed the losses will prove heavy.

Viceroy Alexieff is on his way to Mukden.

The heads of Kuropatkin's long commissary trains have passed through Mukden and are continuing northward.

The attack on Port Arthur continues, the Chinese arriving at Che Foo say the Russian garrison expects a general land and sea attack.
