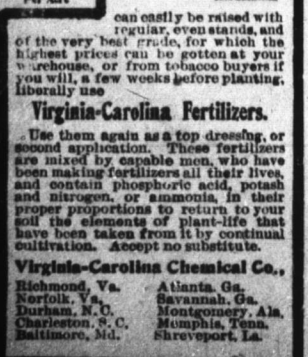
But Rembrandt continued to weep and went on painting the picture of the ape. Then the head of the family grew very angry.
