Two Charges of Porgery.

Richmond Va., Dec. 2-B. Ree buck, who was brought back from Williamston N. C. last night upon an extradation warrant charging him with forgery, was arranged in the police court this morning. The case is continued until January 7 for further evidence. In the meantime, the grand jury, which went into session this morning may indict the voung man.

Ballard, a check for ten dollars, signed L. W. Ballard and Company. The cashier saw Roebuck sign this name.
