The editor of this paper has been asked recently why it is that Williamston's trees are never white-washed, and the town is not beautified. The only reason we can give is that those in charge of these things haven't thought about it, or they are spending all the money on the town hall.

We are afraid to say too much about these things because we have been informed, indirectly, that we have nothing to do with the looks of the town, either from the standpoint of the trees or the wooden shelters. This we admit, inasmuch as the editor is exempted from paying town taxes, and the fact that the paper is subsidized by the town authorities—we print the town financial statement once in about 10 years. [By printing the statement we let the people of the town know what is being done with their money, if it wasn't for letting the people know how the money was spent we rather suspect that the statement would be published in the paper at least once in a century.]

But, at the risk of being called down again, and informed that it is none of our business, we will say this: our town should be made as attractive as possible, and this is more important now than it has ever been, Williamston's business houses and the residences are in keeping with much larger towns, and the streets, walks and trees should be kept in good condition. Besides, whitewashing the trees will preserve them, and make the town more healthful to live in.

If those who are in favor of having the town look clean and attractive will get together and present the matter to the commissioners, we are sure that they will do what is best for the town, for a majority of the commissioners, we are sure, are in favor of having our town look as nice as other towns.

**Profane Use of The Bible**

(News & Observer)

Certain opponents of State prohibition have sought to indict the Christian church and the Christian ministry by assuming to declare that the Holy Bible warrants the use of the sort of intoxicating liquors that are doing more to destroy the morals and efficient work of North Carolina than anything else. Every minister in every church, so far as heard from, is opposed to the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors. They have been at the business of a life time to search the Scriptures and expound the Word. They agree that there is no authority in the Bible for the profane use of texts of Scripture employed to uphold the liquor traffic, and that the worst enemy of the Christian religion is the still and the saloon.

A few days ago the editor of The News and Observer wrote to his school boy preceptor, Elder Sylvester Hassell, of Williamston, editor of Gospel Messenger, leading exponent of the faith as held by Primitive Baptists, and requested an expression of his position in the State prohibition campaign. In reply the following letter has been received:

"Dear Sir:—In reply to your favor of May 8th I would say that distilled liquors were unknown in Scriptural times, and I am opposed to their manufacture and their sale, both publicly and privately, as a beverage. In very small quantities they may occasionally be beneficial to some people as a medicine; but, when I buy a medicine and find it contains alcohol, I pour it out on the ground.

You and Grover have both made yourselves for me and all my trouble was intended to elevate my family, but you see it has failed and I can't see my little children naked and bare-footed and in disgrace. I hate this only on account of their protection. Still I know you will stick to them and see that they have a home. You have all been true loving children to me, and your mamma is an exception. Please don't grieve for me, and don't be afraid of me, by all means don't do that. Don't allow any of our folks see my face, tell them it is against my will. Don't spend one penny of unnecessary money in burying, leave my burying ground to your mamma. Be sure not to let anyone see this as I told you in others, and feel it is all done through love. Good bye and God bless you all.

The above is a copy of the letter written by Mr. McLohon a few hours before he was found dying, shot through the heart at the Episcopal Church gate on the night of February 17, 1908. From it one can see that the act was planned after much deliberation. Thinking that if the fact was fully established his family could not collect his insurance, he insisted upon secrecy in the matter even as he lay dying. In their grief the wife and sons could see no other course but to respect his wishes and remain silent. Later realizing that a cloud rested still upon the law-abiding people of Williamston, they wrote to Sheriff Crawford stating the truth and asking that the mantle of charity be thrown over their act. Every citizen of the town is glad to know that the mystery has been cleared. Many believed from the first that McLohon was a self-murderer. Believing that, they still sympathized with his family and deplored the untimely end of the husband and father. There is no bitterness toward the family for letting the deed cloud for a time the good name of the town. Under the circumstances, they knew no other course, and desired to respect the wish of the dying man.


**Certificate of Dissolution**
