The proper time for cotton seed election being in the fall, the farmer connot do much in this line at planting time. To remedy this, one may procure seed from a neighbor who raises good staple cotton. This is preferable to sending to foreign places, as certain kinds are .5º adapted to certain soils.

Seed peanuts are, perhaps, of more importance than any other. These must be selected as to fertility, productiveness and adaptibility to the soil in which they are to be grown. Why should we plant peanuts that make no more per acre than a pea that sells for one-third more per bushe? The demand for the better grades is always strongest.
