The mighty tread of Theodoré will soon be heard in all this great land. Then what may be expected? Does not the master require a report from his servants after he has taken a journey, and just suppose "My Policies" have not been rightly carried out—shall the thunderings of Mt. Etna be silenced by the terrible outburst here? There will be a chance for somebody to smile.

The fight against tuberculosis is on in earnest. The pulpit has been enlisted to help the cause, and this is a wise move on the part of the medical fraternity. The plague is sweeping through the land, and the only hope is preventives. To have a purer, stronger race, the laws of health must be rigidly enforced. Keep the question before the people and great good will be done.

It is the duty of every citizen to take a part in the government, and unless he is qualified to cast the ballot, how can he enter into that which will make for the best in State and National control? Sheriff Crawford, who is ever interested in the people appeals to the voters in this issue, read his words.

**Malaria's Enemies**

In writing to The Progressive Farmer a correspondent in one of the coast counties says that the health of the people has been very good owing to better drainage and screening doors, and windows against flies and mosquitoes. The correspondent is told by the doctors in his section that there is scarcely any malarial form of disease prevalent now. This is a rather remarkable statement and will cause surprise to upper State people, as some of them look upon the coast counties as greater producers of malaria than anything else. But we can readily believe the statement of the Farmer's correspondent. He should have classed other improvements which have been created such a change for the better in the healthfulness of the part of the State. It has been said that since these sanitary conditions came about the appearance of the people has actually changed. Of one county the remark was made that the inhabitants had the appearance of a different class of people, so greatly had they improved in health since getting the malaria out of their systems by the means mentioned. These facts show what great good knowledge of sanitary laws, if acted upon, will accomplish. —Charlotte Observer.
