How to Keep Well in Summer

In the July Woman's Home Companion Dr. Jean Williams, writing on "How to Keep Well in Summer," says, in part:

"In general, to lighten the digestive burden during the summer months eat sparingly especially of the heat-producing foods. Add green vegetables and fresh ripe fruits generously to the diet. Avoid underripe, overripe or partially decayed fruits as you would poison, for that is exactly what they are. Strawberries and other small-seeded fruits disagree with many people. In such a case, use only the juice of the fruit.

"Ice-water, so commonly and copiously consumed, is very bad for the stomach and sometimes very dangerous. Acute indigestion is often caused by drinking it. As for the ever present soda-fountain, though not all is evil that flows from its faucets, there are few persons whose health will not suffer from indulgence in the sweetened, over-flavored, ice-cream-nut chocolate mixture that are sold so much more commonly than the wholesome grape juice, apple juice, lemonade, zoolack, matzoon or buttermilk. The last named three not only serve as agreeable, refreshing beverages, but are most valuable foods as well.

"Finally let me urge everyone to cultivate the holiday spirit. If you can't have a long vacation, take a short one. If you can't leave your work conform in some manner to summer standards. Picnic as much as you can if you enjoy it. Bat out of doors, if you can do in comparative privacy. In these respects home keeping women are much more fortunate than their brothers and sisters, husbands and fathers, out in the business world because much of their work can be taken out of the stuffy rooms into the air. Fortunately we are all rapidly learning how much of a factor in preserving health this outdoor life may be, and how much it will help us to make our summer—not only healthful but happy."—E. W.
