### Interest Growing in Hookworm Treatment

Including April 6th, 1,565 people in Martin County have been examined, showing an infection of 36.6 per cent as follows:

Judging by the number of people who have already been examined for hookworm disease, we must infer that we have progressive, wide awake people in the county; people who, when given an opportunity will make the most of it; however, there are still many who have not taken advantage of the opportunity offered by the State and County Free Dispensaries—some, no doubt, from lack of time, yet some from lack of interest.

There was a time when "hookworm disease" was looked upon as an innovation merely to fill the newspapers; now, however, it is regarded by the physicians as being one of the most common diseases among the Southern people, where the moisture, warmth and soil are especially adapted for the propagation of the parasite. And the sooner people awaken to the fact that one in every three of us is infected with the disease, and the sooner we familiarize ourselves with the simple method of preventing the spread of the disease, the more quickly will the disease be eradicated.

The disease is very insidious, as it is often slow in progress, and so mild that the patient continues his occupation; drags along with a bad feeling day after day; fails to consult a physician; continues to grow weaker, as the disease is very debilitating and finally, his system, being no longer able to resist one of the many germs which are constantly entering his body, is overcome by typhoid fever, pneumonia or tuberculosis, etc. This disease would be far less serious if it made every victim sick enough to consult a physician. So if you have any symptoms of the disease, be examined either at one of the dispensaries or by your physician.

Let everyone take a hand in the campaign, and let us free ourselves of this disease. Are you one of the three that is infected or are you on the other side? Have you been examined? If not, you haven't done your duty.

To have hookworm disease is no more reflection than to have typhoid fever or malaria. They are all preventable diseases. However, if any part of the skin comes in contact with the dirt which has been contaminated with night-soil, it may be penetrated by the little hookworms which produce "ground-itch" as they enter. To prevent the disease, wear shoes and cease soil pollution by using a sanitary closet. Pamphlets on Hookworm Disease and Sanitary closets are gladly furnished free at the dispensaries. Ask for them.

It has been several weeks since some people in the county took the first treatment for hookworm disease. Many of them have returned for a second, third, and some even, for a fourth treatment. There has been marked improvement in most of the cases who have taken several treatments. They say they feel energetic, and have lost that tired, listless feeling. You cannot expect much improvement from only one treatment, several are necessary. And remember that immediately after a treatment, you feel a little sick and probably worse than before taking it; however, do not let that condition prevent your taking more treatment, as you cannot expect any great improvement under several weeks.

### Medical Men Meet

The third semi-annual meeting of the Second District Medical Society was called to order at 8:30 o'clock Wednesday evening in the rooms of the Lotus Club by the secretary, Dr. K. P. B. Bonner, of Morehead City. In the absence of the President, Dr. David T. Tayloe, of Washington, Dr. J. B. H. Knight was chosen temporary President by acclamation. Dr. John D. Biggs welcomed the guests in a most happy manner and this was responded to by Dr. John C. C. Rodman, of Washington. The presence of Dr. R. L. Payne, Jr., of Norfolk, was highly appreciated and the hospitality of the Society was extended to him, and he was made to feel the warmth of the welcome in the heart of each member. A welcome was also extended to Dr. T. E. Hughes, who has charge of Hookworm dispensaries now in the county.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Dr. J. L. Nicholson, of Washington, read a most instructive paper on "Intussusception in an Adult with a Report of a Case. Upon which Drs. Rodman and Payne made some very interesting comments. The next paper, "Hemorrhagic Hemoglobinuria," by Dr. B. M. Long, of Hamilton, was excellent, dealing as it did with the treatment of one of the most fatal diseases prevalent in malaria districts.

A vote of thanks was given Dr. Long after an interesting discussion of the subject by several of the physicians, who have had many cases in their practice.

The election of officers followed and those chosen were: Dr. W. B. Warren, President; Dr. P. A. Nicholson, of Washington, 1st. V. Pres't; Dr. E. M. Long, of Hamilton, 2nd. V. Pres't; Dr. K. P. B. Bonner, re-elected Secretary and Treasurer.

Drs. Halsey and Flowers of the 1st. District asked that the counties of Washington, Tyrrell and Hyde be admitted to the 2nd. District. The presiding officer appointed Drs. Halsey, Spruill and Ward as a committee to make application to the State Medical Society for the admission of these three counties. It was decided to hold the next meeting in Greenville in October.
