Woodrow Wilson The Man

The revolt of the voters of the country on Tuesday against the Republican party, was greater than ever in the history of politics in the American Nation. For days the great papers of the North had predicted the election of Woodrow Wilson, but the figures were astonishing to every man who voted for or against the Democratic nominees.

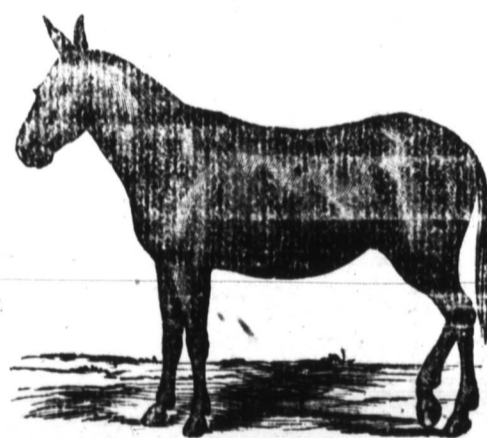
