THE FOURTH COMMANDMENT

It is estimated that the spread of the knowledge of Christ is greater now than at any period since Apostolic times; that there is more activity in missionary work than ever before. But at the same time people are failing to take Christ into their business and social life with the same degree. Millions are donated to missions; the condition of the poor and oppressed is more carefully looked after and ameliorated; more care and protection are given to helpless children; plans are greater for the uplift of those who have sunk deep into the evils of intemperance. Yet with all these things being done, there is something out of harmony somewhere, some how.

We believe that the desecration of the Holy Sabbath Day is the mercury which denotes the temperament of the times. In our homes where the first altar should be raised, there is that laxity which makes the observance of the day a mere form. Men and women forget to train their children to regard the Sabbath as a day apart from the ordinary things of life. And why? Because they have fallen into a nominal observance themselves. Actual manual labor may cease in the household, but many diversions occupy the hours of the day, creating a tone contrary to the spirit of the Fourth Commandment. Local laws forbid the sale of goods from stores, yet anything from a suit of clothes to a toothpick can be purchased. Even the market is kept open for customers in the early hours of the morning, and blind tigers get an early start to catch not the worm, but the Sunday boozier. Later the bells call to service, and amid their sounds, the honk of automobiles is heard and should-be worshippers are being whirled away over the good or bad roads, as the case may be. If the law for the civil observance of the Sabbath would be enforced by those whose duty it is, the evil would be greatly lessened, and people would be made to feel that this is a country inhabited by God's children and not by Sabbath breakers. Should the men who desire to turn the day into one of profit or debauchery, set the pace for us to follow? Are we doing our whole duty when we attend religious services twice during the day and close our lips instead of proclaiming against the contempt for law and order which seems to be abroad in the land? Right is in the hands of the many, and not at the will of a few whose sole aim is to lead for godless living in the community.
