Fire Prevention Day

Gov. Lock Craig has set apart the 9th of October as Fire Prevention Day through the State. In this proclamation he asks that the schools, colleges, mayors, urge the necessity of looking after the condition of premises in every community. There are certain laws which have been enacted for fire prevention, and these are called to the attention of the people. Careless lighting of fires with kerosene and other inflammable material causes great loss of life and property every year in North Carolina. If people would only think and act with caution, this loss would be reduced largely. Children need to be taught what to do and what not to do, and the teachers in the schools should pay especial attention to the proper instruction along this line. Don't forget that October 9th is Fire Prevention Day.

Average 11 1-2 Cents

The Export Tobacco Company went on the market to-day and prices at once felt the effect. There were around 300,000 lbs on the market and averaged 11 1-2 cents.—Wilson Times, Sep 28th.

A representative of the Export Leaf Co., has been on this market since opening day, and farmers here did not have to wait until the 28th for the market to show an average of 11 1-2 cents. As an instance of the high prices given here, the Edwards Brothers, of Winston-Salem, came here and found the market too high and so left for a lower one, where they could purchase for their firm.
