COTTON WEIGHER

The near completion of the store warehouse, brings to our mind the need of a cotton and peanut weigher for the market. Nearly all markets the size of Williamston have them and find their work satisfactory. The small fee for the services saves the buyer much trouble, and insures the seller uniform and correct weights.

The certificate of a sworn weigher would enable the shipper to check against short weights, when produce is sent to Commission Houses. Every shipper feels the loss in weights very heavily at each season. There is no reason why Williamston should not have a weigher.

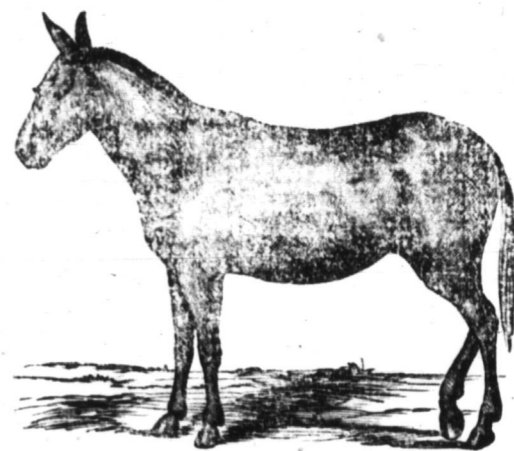
