ORDINANCE REQUIRING WATER & SEWER CONNECTION

The board of Aldermen of William ston do enact:

1. That each and every residence institution, depot or place of busines where one or more persons reside lolge or are employed, which is located on a lot or property abutting upon or adjoining a street or alley along which a public sewer is laid. slab be provided with a flush toilet and the necessary plumbing fixture. to join and connect the same with the public water and sewerage sys tem, provided: that a length of private sewer line not greater than two hundred feet and a length of private water-line not greater than three hundred feet, shall be required to make such connections Provided., further that it is not necessary to lay water and sewer lines across private prop erty of some other person or person in order to make such connections.

2. At the discretion and by the di rection of the Board of Aledrmen, the city clerk shall serve notice on the owner or owners or the duly authorized agent of such owner or owners of property coming under teh provision of this ordinance. Said notice to be either written or printed. In case of any non-resident owner or owners of such property, not represented rocally · duly authorized agent or agents retice may be published in five suc ressive issues of a local newspaper.

3. The city clerk shall mail t every resident under section 1 and 2 of these ordinances a blank form of application, for the installation of flush toilets and necessary plumbing fixtures as set forth in section 1 of these ordinances, upon receipt of said application the owner or agents for the owners of any property as set forth in section 1, shall fill in said application and file it with the Supt. of Water Works, M. S. Moore, within 60 days from the 15th day of April,

4. Non compliance with section 1 or three of these ordinances within 60 days from April 15, 1921. After receipt of publication of notice sell forth in section 2 of this ordinance and etc., shall constitute a misdemeanor and subject the owner or own ers or the duly authorized agent for the owners of such property to a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars in the discretion of the court.

All ordinances and clauses of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

At no other point in its path is it so large.
