**To Revive Forestry Work In This State**

Extension Service to Divert Every Effort to Save the Forests of North Carolina

RALEIGH, Jan. 4.—According to an announcement from Director B. W. Kigore of the North Carolina Extension service, H. M. Curran, a graduate of the State college and a native born North Carolinian, has been appointed extension specialist in farm forestry to help Tar Heel farmers in handling the farm woodlots and otherwise developing the farm forestry industry of this state.

Mr. Curran has been well trained. He has been in the employ of the United States Forest service for years and during that time has made studies of forestry problems all over the entire country. He has also seen seven years service in the Philippine Islands and about five years service in the tropical forests of South America. Recently he had charge of a lecture course of tropical forestry at Yale university.

He comes to North Carolina after these years of service and study to render assistance in any of the forestry problems that may be acute with the farmers of North Carolina at this time. It will be remembered that this work was formerly done by Harry I. Kraus who left the extension service shortly after the war.

For some time the work has been hampered because a suitable man could not be found to carry it on. Now that Mr. Curran has been secured, farmers of the state wanting help with their farm wood lot problems or any other problem dealing with the woodlands on their home place should take up these questions with him.

**FORD SALES RECORD IS ABOVE AVERAGE**

Best November Sales In the History of the Ford Business

According to a statement issued by the Ford Motor company, deliveries of Ford cars and trucks to retail buyers during the month of November totalled 106,327. While the company points out that it is not unusual for Ford retail sales to exceed the 100,000 mark during the spring and early summer months when the demand is at its peak, the manner in which business has held up throughout the balance of the year is without precedent.

Credit for this remarkable showing is attributed by the Ford Motor company to the many improvements that have lately been made on Ford cars and particularly to the new low level of Ford prices, recently put into effect.

fect. These new low prices not only broaden the field of prospective Ford purchasers but go still further in making the Ford car the best value from the standpoint of the retail buyer, that it has ever been.

Although the Ford factories have been operating at capacity for the past eight months, sales have equalled production and judging from the unusual manner in which orders are coming in at this season of the year Ford dealers will be unable to accumulate an adequate stock of cars during the winter months for delivery the next spring.

In the opinion of the Ford Motor company, November sales are an indication that many prospective purchasers, realizing the exceptional value now being offered in Ford cars, are beginning to anticipate an unusual spring demand and are therefore placing orders during the fall and will continue to do so throughout the winter to avoid disappointing delays in delivery later on. While this will relieve the situation to some extent, it is pointed out that the steadily increasing demand for Ford cars is nevertheless sure to create an acute shortage as the season advances.

**CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION OF THE ASSOCIATION OF BROTHERS UNDER THE SKIN**

We, the undersigned, all being persons of full age and all being citizens of the United States and residents of the State of North Carolina, desiring to form a Membership Corporation pursuant to the Membership Corporations Law of the State of North Carolina, do hereby make and acknowledge this certificate for that purpose and certify:

First: The name of the proposed Association shall be

ASSOCIATION OF BROTHERS UNDER THE SKIN

Second: The purpose for which the Association is formed, are as follows:

a. To establish, maintain and operate the Household primarily as a Masculine Institution.

b. To establish the Husband in sole and undisputed control of the Household budget and bank account.

c. To protect the Husband from the performing of any and all household duties, such as sweeping, marketing, cooking, washing dishes and running the kitchen or furnace fires.

d. To prevent any purchases by the Wife, whether for cash or credit, except after consultation with the Husband and after his consent.

e. To prevent the entrance into the Home, of mother-in-law and all relatives on the Wife's side, except upon written permit signed by an officer of the Association, which permits shall not be issued for use on Saturdays, Sundays or Holidays.

f. To prevent the delivery into the Home of all so-called "delicacies meals," and to compel the serving of regular food, home cooked.

g. To prevent any reference however much justified, by the Wife, to any past faults or present deficiencies of the Husband.

h. To establish the right of the Husband to absent himself from the Home for a specified number of evenings each month to attend business, lodge and club meetings; and to establish his right to return therefrom at any reasonable hour, to be fixed solely by himself.

i. To develop "Cave man method" for the better discipline of jealous, nagging or unreasonable wives.

j. To establish the exclusive right of the Husband to determine the brevity of his Wife's hair and the length of the Wife's skirts.

k. To compel the Wife to share in the troubles as well as in the pleasures of married life; and to establish the fact that the Wife's place is at Home and that her duty is to cooperate to make the Home happy.

Third: The principal office of the Association shall be at No. 116 1-2 Fayetteville Street, City of Raleigh, County of Wake, and State of North Carolina. The Association may establish other branches and conduct its operations in every City, Town and Village of the United States of America and elsewhere.

Fourth: The number of its directors shall be three. The names and places of residence of the three persons to be its directors until the first annual meeting of the Association, are the following: Ike Wilborn, Pughs Hill, N. C. Toliver Terrell, Sr., Pughs Hill, N. C. Galian M. Boyer, Pughs Hill, N. C.

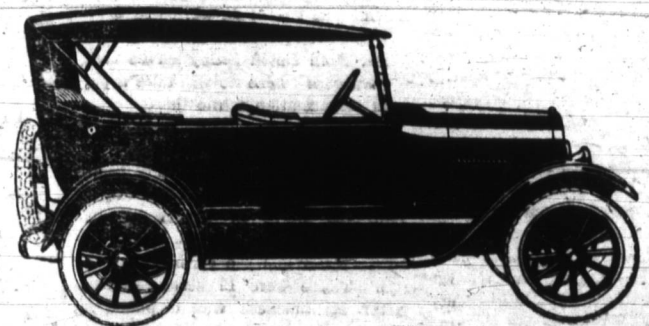
