THE REPUBLICAN "CIVIL SERVICE" IN THE SOUTH

For eighteen months a republican has been acting as postmaster at Bedford, Trimble county, Kentucky. On August 13, 1921, a civil service examination was held for this office and the highest three ratings were all obtained by democrats.

Under President Wilson the appointment of a postmaster went to the person with the highest rating regardless of politics. Under an executive order issued by President Harding one of the highest three was made eligible for appointment.

After eighteen months a republican continues to act as postmaster at Bedford, Ky. Bedford is in the district of Representative Arthur Rouse, the chairman of the democratic congressional campaign committee.

This would not have been such a remarkable thing even if the senator could have confirmed it by actual figures, because our foreign exports for 1921 and 1922 were only about one half of what they were in 1920, the last year of the Wilson administration.

ROAD BILL GOES THROUGH HOUSE WITHOUT CHANGE

TWO HOURS OF ARGUMENT ON PROPOSED AMENDMENTS PROVE FUTILE

RALEIGH, Jan. 27.—Sweeping every amendment offered under an avalanche of negative votes, the house yesterday morning passed the Moore road bill on its third reading by a vote of 85 to 9 without the alteration of a single provision originally written into it.

Three amendments were offered and debated at some length by the majority. Hugh Wynn of Northampton proposed to give the first district an additional appropriation of \$200,000.

Most of the two hours taken up in the discussion was in advocacy of the three amendments. Only one speech was made in reply to the general movement to amend the bill, and that was made by Representative H. G. Connor, who devoted himself primarily to the Quickel amendment and by a two sentence speech by Wright of Guilford, whose county pays more of the road income than any other and who declared that Guilford didn't want any of it back.

Republicans in the house repudiated their leader, when they joined with Cowles of Wilkes, in declaring that he did not speak for the minority in the house, or the minority in the state when he spoke against and voted against the road building program.

PRICE OF SOFT COAL ON DOWN GRADE AGAIN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—Bituminous coal prices which have shown a strong advancing tendency in recent weeks are now turning downward, according to complaints given out by F. R. Dudgeon, federal fuel distributor.

During the week ending January 22, available statistics indicate the average price of the product at the mine was \$4.33 per ton as compared with \$4.42 the previous week, and \$4.54, the average price reported for the week ending January 8.

The drop, Mr. Wadleigh said, is considered in trade circles to be due to the vanishing of fear concerning a possible strike in the coal fields, mild weather and better transportation conditions.
