

TAR-HEEL PEACH CROP IS WELL DISTRIBUTED

COOPERATION SHOWS ITS BENEFIT IN YAST YEAR'S PRODUCE CROP

RALEIGH, Mar. 12.—The part co-operation plays in the distribution of products was well illustrated last season with the North Carolina peach crop, reports Gorrell Shumaker of the division of markets of the State college and department of agriculture.

North Atlantic states took 753 of these 1121 cars, New England states 205 cars, southern states 110 cars, middle western states 39 cars and Canada 14 cars. Cities which received more than 50 cars each were as follows: New York 310 cars, Philadelphia 206 cars (some of these were for diversion), Boston 152 cars, Washington 55 cars, Baltimore 54 cars. About 65 cars were originally billed to Potomac Yards, Va., for diversion from that point.

North Carolina peaches during the latter July and early August were more abundant in the markets at Boston, Philadelphia and Washington than peaches from any other state. Georgia peaches were in second place. In New York and Pittsburg, North Carolina stock was second with Georgia first.

JUMPS FROM TOP OF WASHINGTON MONUMENT

WASHINGTON, Mar. 11.—A leap from a small window near the top of the Washington monument, 504 feet from the ground, brought instant death today to A. Birney Seip, grandson of the late General William Birney, who served with distinction during the Civil war as brigadier general in the Union army.

Seip had been suffering from a nervous disease for several years, relatives said, and had left home unknown to his mother. He had suffered a breakdown several years ago while attending Cornell university, and had just come home from a Philadelphia sanitarium. Monument attendants expressed the belief Seip could not have fallen from the window, which is only about 18 inches high and three feet wide.

Although there are attendants stationed at the top, no one saw Seip leave the window. His shoes were ripped off by friction from contacts with the side of the monument and the force of the wind during the plunge.

MOONSHINER KILLED BY WILSON OFFICER

WILSON, Mar. 10.—While raiding a moonshine still near Elm City yesterday afternoon, Ernest Hawkins, colored, one of the two operators, fired at Sheriff Glover and his posse and broke and ran.

Public Officer Lloyd Lages, one of the raiders, threw up his pump gun and shot Hawkins dead in his tracks. The finding at the coroner's inquest today exonerated the officer, on the grounds of justified homicide. The still was the largest ever taken in Wilson county.

AGED WHITE MAN HELD FOR ASSAULT ON GIRL

WASHINGTON, N. C., Mar. 10.—H. R. Daw, a white man, said to be over sixty years of age, is now confined in the Beaufort county jail, in lieu of a \$2,500 bond for his personal appearance at the next term of criminal court of Beaufort county superior court for an alleged criminal assault upon a seven year old white girl. The crime was alleged to have been committed either in the months of January or February. Recorder W. L. Vaughan, sitting as a committing magistrate only, conducted the preliminary hearing Tuesday and upon the consent of counsel for both sides fixed the bond of the defendant at \$2,500. The case will be threshed out in the higher court.
