THE TREASURY WILL NEED NO MORE SILVER AFTER JULY

WASHINGTON, Mar. 31. Prediction that the treasury requirements of silver bullion purchased under the Pittman act will be fulfilled by July 1st, was made tonight by Director Scobey, of the mint. He said that about 20,000,000 fine ounces remain to be bought under the act and es-

timated that with silver production averaging between six million and seven million ounces monthly, purchases during the next three months will make up the amount needed. The purchases will stop abruptly when the requirements have been met and for that reason the director said every effort will be made to assure the American miners that full benefits of the act "up to the latest possible date." While not guaranteeing it, he declared that the policy will be to see that the miners obtain to the finish the price of one dollar per ounce, 1,000 fine, for their product.

ROMAN FINDS RINGS; NEGRO BOY RELEASED

GREENSBORO, Mar. 31. — Henry Miller, a negro delivery boy, was released today of the charge of stealing two diamond rings, valued at \$800, from the residence of Mrs. F. P. Abernethy here.
