

PLANTING GOOD SEED PAY AGAIN

FARMER NEAR TARBORO IS ELATED OVER THE RESULTS OBTAINED

TARBORO, April 2.—Near Conctee in the county lives H. G. Brown and Frank L. Castex, farmer neighbors with lands adjoining. Both of them were for years content to plant such cotton seed as was secured in the general run from their farms or from the local ginners. But about five years ago, Mr. Brown became interested in the idea of using better seed and in producing better seed on his own place. He finally joined the combe Seed Breeders association and worked in close cooperation with the county agent, Zeno Moore and Dr. R. Y. Winters of the experiment station staff.

Mr. Moore states that neighbor Castex still stuck to the "same old seed" until in 1921 when he saw such fine cotton in the fields across the way that he was convinced good seed would pay. Last year, he purchased some seed from neighbor Brown and planted fifty acres to the improved variety. His tenants planted 92 acres from the same old seed formerly used on the place. The land was about the same and fertilized the same; but to make a long story short, the tenants got 46 bales from their 90 acres and only six of these graded a good as middling. From his 50 acres, Mr. Castex secured 52 bales, only four of which graded as low as middling.

Mr. Moore thinks this is a good example of the value of using better seed. Most of the improved seed now being used in Edgecombe county came from testing work placed several years ago by Agent Moore cooperating with Dr. R. Y. Winters, plant breeder for the North Carolina experiment station. The work has been carried forward by the Edgecombe Seed Breeders association and the county becoming well known for the quality of its cotton seed.

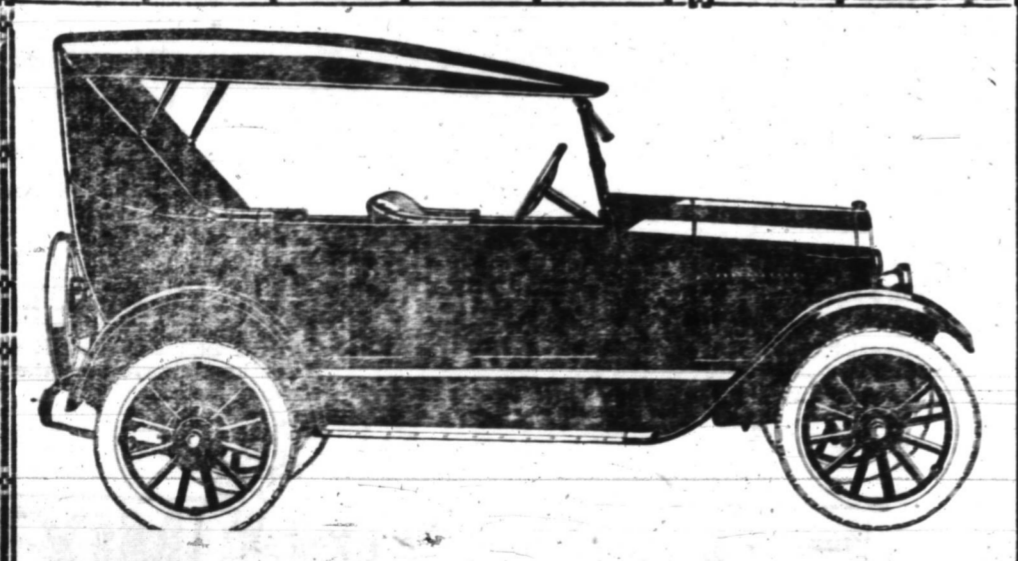
