**SPRING TIME COMES
WITH CONGRESS SEED**

**TRUSTEES OF UNIVERSITY
WILL MEET AT CHAPEL
HILL, APRIL THE 19TH**

RALEIGH, April 4. The board of trustees of the University of North Carolina will hold a meeting at Chapel Hill, April 19th to take final action on the institution's building program for the next two years. Decision on the proposed building for the women will be reached at this time.

The building committee will meet April 18th to frame its report for the board. A sub-committee appointed to inspect buildings at the North Carolina College for women, Greensboro, will submit its plans for the university women's building. The committee has practically decided in favor of the building; it has been authoritatively stated.

The university has a total of \$1,650,000 to spend on permanent improvements during the next two years.

**ROAD COSTS INCREASE
ABOUT 20 PER CENT**

Cox Says Possibly Some Contract Will Be Held Up—Bids Opened in Raleigh Tuesday.

GREENSBORO, April 5.—Bids on North Carolina highway construction opened in Raleigh Tuesday reveal an increase in prices approximating 20 per cent, according to J. Elwood Cox of High Point, highway commissioner for the fifth district who passed through Greensboro Tuesday night.

As a result, it is possible, Mr. Cox thinks that some of the contracts will be held up pending fuller investigation by the commission into the cause of the increased prices. Contractors are understood to be doubtful about the price of labor during the coming months.
