HIGHLAND PARK FORD PLANT IS WORLD'S BIGGEST

PLANT IS USED TO ASSEMBLE CARS THAT ARE MADE AT OTHER FORD PLANTS

Covering a total of 300 acres, which 123 are under roof, the Highland Park plant of the Ford Motor company is the largest industrial plant in the world. Here the Ford car is built, the engines being received from the Rouge plant and bodies from the various Ford body building plants.

The unit of Highland Park is the main office, the Highland Power plant, the Detroit sales branch, the boys' industrial school and the manufacturing unit. Under the latter head are included the motor assembly, car assembly, motor test, top and upholstery departments, stock rooms, strip wire plant, glass factory and more.

Today these plants present to the eye the picture of a city. The history of the Ford Motor company as every engine is assembled, reaching 6,000 a day and assembled by the manufacturing department.

The manufacturing department of Ford units daily produces 10,000 production figures and sells for the highest degree of accuracy in manufacturing operations. It means that in the motor assembly department 6,000 motor blocks are being 24,000 connecting rods, 24,000 pistons and necessary mechanical parts.

Production at the plant has been increased by more work but increasing more power to the extent of the mechanical equipment installed and at the present time 10,000 are employed at the plant, working in eight hour shifts, six days a week on a twenty-four hour basis.

Food motors in the plant are being tested. No human agency permitted to pass a motor. Each of the units is tested by a mechanical operator by a test which is repeated under the supervision of an inspector while in a room separate and apart from this, the defects of the motor are recorded by the test to be of most fitness and to pass the verdict of this instrument that each motor receives the first stamp of approval.

Though 1922 set an all-time record of 1,700,000 the production was under the same conditions as in 1921, and it is expected that the production of the year will pass the production of 1921 and one half million more trucks.

AMENDMENTS TO THE LAWS RELATIVE TO MORTGAGE: An Act to Facilitate the Examination of Titles and to Create a Presumption of Payment of Instruments Securing the Payment of Money After Fifteen Years From the Date of Maturity of the Debts Secured Thereby.

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact: Section 1. That section two thousand five hundred and ninety four of the Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina be amended by adding a new sub-section, as follows: 5. That the conditions of every mortgage, deed of trust, or other instrument securing the payment of money shall be conclusively presumed to have been complied with or the debt secured thereby paid, as against creditors or purchasers for a value in consideration from the trustor, mortgagor, or grantor, from and after the expiration of fifteen years from the date when the conditions of such instrument by the terms thereof are due to have been complied with or the maturity of the last installment of debt or interest secured thereby, unless the holder of the indebtedness secured by such instrument or party secured by any provision thereof shall file an affidavit with the register of deeds of the county where such instrument is registered, in which shall be specially stated the amount of debt unpaid which is secured by said instrument or in what respect any other condition thereof shall not have been complied with whereupon the register of deeds shall record such affidavit and refer on the margin of the record of the instrument referred to therein the fact of the filing of such affidavit, and a reference to the book and page where it is recorded. Or, in lieu of such affidavit, the holder may enter on the margin of the record any payments that have been made on the indebtedness, secured by such instrument, and shall in such entry state the amount still due thereunder. This entry must be signed by the holder and witnessed by the register of deeds: Provided, however, that this sub-section shall not apply to any deed, mortgage, deed of trust, or other instrument made or given by a railroad company, or to agreement of conditional sale equipment trust agreement, lease, chattel mortgage, or other instrument relating to the sale, purchase, or lease of railroad equipment or rolling stock, or of other personal property.

Section 2. In case of foreclosure of any deed of trust or mortgage, the trustee or mortgagee shall enter upon the margin of the record thereof the fact of such foreclosure and the date when, and the person to whom, a conveyance was made by reason thereof.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of any trustee or mortgagee making sale under the provisions of any power to file the account with the clerk of the Superior Court in the county where the land lies as is required by commissioners making sales for partition, and for the auditing and recording of said account the clerk shall be allowed the same fees as are provided for auditing accounts of such commissioners.

Section 4. Upon ratification of this act, the Secretary of State shall certify copies to every register of deeds in the state, whose duty it shall be to post such copies in a conspicuous place in his office and cause same to be published for one month in some newspaper in the county. The expense of such publication shall be borne by the county.

Section 5. This act shall be in force from and after January first, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-four.

Section 6. All laws and clauses of laws conflicting herewith are hereby repealed. Ratified this 6th day of March, A. D. 1923. 5-8-41.
