#### MENDMENTS TO THE LAWS RELATIVE TO MORTGAGE

n Act to Facilitate the Examination of Titles and to Create a Presump tion of Payment of Instruments Se curing the Payment of Money Afte Fifteen Years From the Date o Maturity of the Debts Secure

The General Assembly of North Car olina do enact:

Section 1. That section two thou and five hundred and ninety fou f the Consolidated Stautes of North Carolina be amended by adding a new ub-section, as follows:

5. That the conditions of every nortgage, deed of trust, or other in trument securing the payment of money shall be conclusively presum ed to have been complied with or the lebt secured thereby paid, as agains reditors or purchasers for a value ble consideration from the trusto mortgagor, or grantor, from and af ter the expiration of fifteen year rom the date when the conditions of such instrument by the terms thereo ere due to have been complied with or the maturity of the last installmen of debt or interest secured thereby anless the holder of the indebtednes secured by such instrument or party secured by any provision thereof shall file an affidavit with the register o leeds of the county where such in strument is registered, in which shall be specially stated the amount of debt unpaid which is secured by said iner condition thereof shall not have been complied with whereupon the to therein the fact of the filing of in the course of construction, and to such affidavit, and a reference to the include all personal property now or book and page where it is recorded at any time hereafter in the operation Or, in lieu of such affidavit, the holder
