Wages of common labor for road work in February were practically the same as for the same month in 1922 according to the Bureau of Public Roads, U. S. Department of Agriculture. Averaged for groups of states the price per hour was as follows: New England, 48 cents; middle Atlantic, 49 cents; west north central, 50 cents; south Atlantic, 21 cents; east south central, 19 cents; west south central, 24 cents; mountains, 38 cents; and Pacific, 47 cents. In some of these sections the figures are based on a small amount of work due to the season of year. The price per hour for other classes was as follows: Superintendents, 79 cents to \$1.11; foremen, 53 to 88 cents; truck drivers, 27 to 64 cents; roller engines, 35 to 81 cents; mixer operators, 31 to 98 cents; steam shovel operators, 65 to \$1.19; carpenters, 43 to 76 cents; concrete finishers, 35 to 78 cents; mechanics, 30 to 61 cents; teams without drivers, 24 to 80 cents; and teams with drivers, 29 to \$1.12. In almost every case the upper limit of price prevails on the Pacific slope with materially lower prices in other sections.

WILSON AGAIN WINS EAST CAROLINA'S BIG EXPOSITION. WILSON, May 23. — The Eastern Carolina exposition again comes to this city. This was the announcement of the board of directors after the bids were opened yesterday afternoon. George Barfoot, one of the Wilson directors, made the offer for Wilson, which was \$7,500. The bid of Winston was \$5,000. While the statement of Mr. Bartlett showed that the exposition had not cleared any money, it demonstrated the splendid value as an advertisement and the high bid of Wilson showed the appreciation that it felt here. Mr. Bartlett made the announcement that checks for the first installment of the proceeds are being mailed to the guarantors.
