The Board of Education of Martin county having presented a petition asking that a special election be held in Everett's School district, for the purpose of issuing bonds in a sum not to exceed FIFTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$15,000) to build and equip a modern school building in the said district, and it appearing to the board that said petition is in accordance with the provisions of Article 2 of "An Act to amend the Constitution of North Carolina," Pub. A special election is hereby ordered to be held on Tuesday, the 24th day of July, 1923, in Everett's School District, Martin county, said district being bounded as follows: Beginning at the mouth of Island branch in Tranters creek; thence an easterly course up said branch to the new road; thence along the new road to Pine Thick branch; thence an easterly course to the Spring branch; thence easterly to the Cow branch; thence a northeasterly course with the lines of Tom Robertson and W. T. Cullifer to the railroad; thence with the lines of W. T.
