

Work House for Slacker Husbands

DENVER, Col., Nov. 4.—Judge Ben B. Lindsey asked the Denver city council last Monday night for the \$146,000 which he recently declared had cut the city's birth rate in half.

Judge Lindsey repeated his recommendations made in a communication to the Denver county grand jury, urging that the investigating body recommend appropriation for the maternity fund for the protection of the unborn babies and for the mothers compensation fund to care for destitute mothers.

He also urged the establishment of a work house as provided by law for husbands and fathers who fail to support their families.

"I want to call attention to the so-called maternity law, which provides that any child endangered for any cause before birth, shall have been in coming into the world properly whether the mother is married or unmarried," Judge Lindsey declared.

Judge Lindsey Saturday night issued a statement in which he declared that he would establish a control clinic in connection with his court unless he was provided with funds with which to combat the abortion menace through the regular constituted channels.

COTTON LETTER FROM CO-OPS.

Lawrence McIne, sales manager of the North Carolina Cotton Growers Cooperative association gives out the following statement:

On Monday, October 23, December New York cotton opened at 29.60 and on Saturday, October 27, closed at 30.69, or practically five dollars a bale advance.

During this period the association took advantage of the advance and sold with discretion.

Trade demand was fairly good until December futures reached the vicinity of 31 cents. At this level the farmers and local merchants all over the belt are reported to have sold on a basis irrespective of New York December cotton and consequently deplete. Up to this point a very firm basis had been maintained by producers and local merchants. The association is holding its basis firm and expects to be a big factor in stabilizing the basis and overcoming the unwarranted demoralization of the present week end.

Cotton mills are buying requirements in large volume from producers and country merchants who are cashing in extensively.

DANVILLE CO-OPS. ARE RESTRAINED BY COURT. Auction Warehousemen Secure Injunction to Halt Further Arrests by the Co-ops.

DANVILLE, Va., Oct. 31.—The auction warehousemen of Danville yesterday launched a counter offensive against the forces of cooperative marketing by securing from Judge Daniel Frie Witzler of the corporation court a temporary restraining order forbidding the city and state officers of the city to issue warrants against the warehousemen against whom are all old violations of the Virginia tobacco marketing law adopted by the last session of the legislature.

The restraining order was issued without notice, in other words, the court granted the injunction after reading the voluminous petition without hearing from the other side.

Notices were prepared and sent to local officials of the "pool" this afternoon and it was expected that contest would be staged and that the association would seek to dissolve the injunction on a day to be set for the hearing of evidence.
