GAS BOAT STERLING GOES TO BOTTOM IN PAMLIC SOUND

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—The gas boat "Sterling" belonging to Mayor C. H. Sterling, of this city while enroute here from New Bern where she had been undergoing repair when the eastward of Brandt Island in Pamlico Sound went to the bottom Sunday morning. It is thought that the boat came in contact with some obstruction causing the boat to sink within less than 10 minutes.

The crew, consisting of captain and engineer barely had time to escape in a small row boat. They rowed to Hoboke about 10 miles away and from there went to Aurora and thence on here.

Mayor Sterling and a party went to the scene yesterday on the steamer "Washington" and located the sunk boat. Efforts will be made at once to recover her from her perilous position.

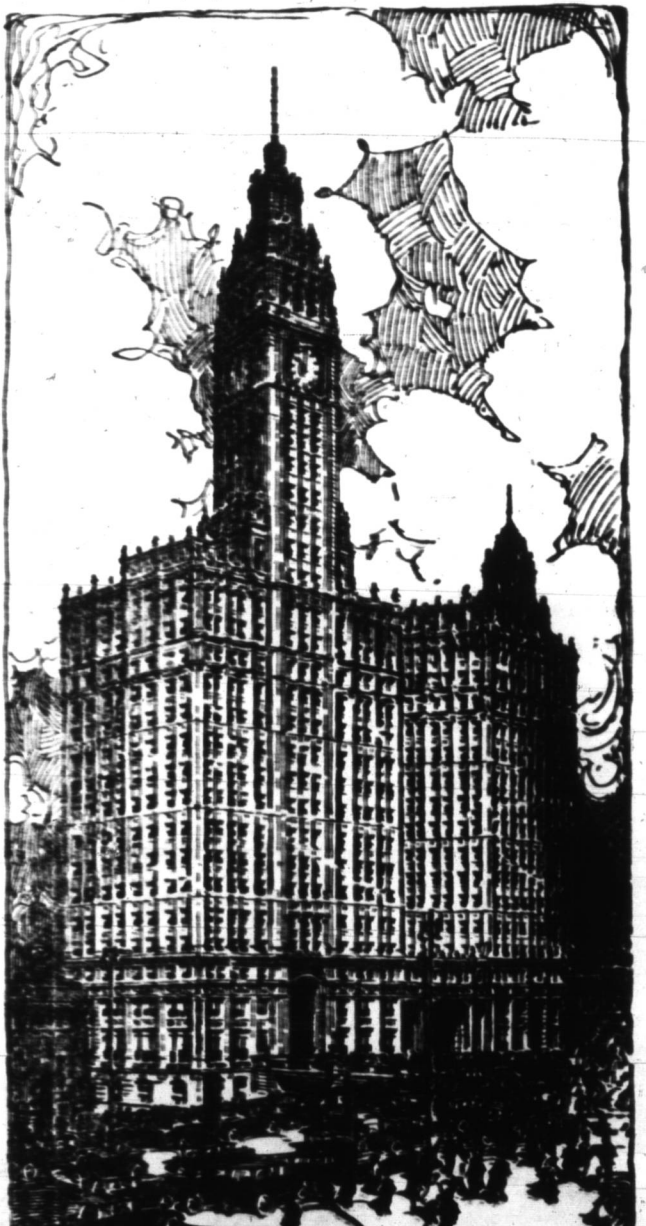
