

TOBACCO GROWERS BEGIN NEW YEAR OUT OF DEBT

Raleigh, N. C., Jan. 2.—The Tobacco Growers' Co-operative Association closed the old year by the payment of all debts due, including mortgages and debts of trust assumed at the purchase of its warehouse properties. It also retired all of its class A stock on its warehouses in eastern North Carolina, central North Carolina and South Carolina, and paid all dividends on class A stock, amounting in all to many thousands of dollars, according to the announcement of Treasurer James H. Craig.

The prompt payment of all its debts to date by the tobacco cooperative will be followed in early January by the payment of dividends on all outstanding preferred stock of the five warehouse corporations which are subsidiary to the Tobacco Growers' Co-operative Association, an announcement of its directors said. The association is in a stronger financial position than at any time in its history, according to the announcement of its finance department in Richmond. It will pay several million dollars to all of its members in the old belt who delivered bright tobacco of the 1922 crop, next week when the third distribution will be made from the cooperative houses of Virginia and western North Carolina on January 10.

DESCENDANTS OF N. C. GOVERNOR AT UNVEILING

JONATHAN WORTH'S PORTRAIT PRESENTED TO STATE AT RALEIGH CEREMONIES

Raleigh, N. C., Jan. 2.—With descendants from the first through the fourth generations present, as well as a group of State officials of North and South Carolina, the portrait of Jonathan Worth, governor of North Carolina from 1865 through 1868, was presented to the State here at noon today. Associate Justice W. A. Hoke, of the North Carolina supreme court, made the presentation on behalf of Governor Worth's two surviving daughters, Mrs. E. E. Moffitt, of Richmond, Va., and Mrs. Adelaide Worth Bagley, of Washington, D. C. Present at the ceremony today were children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren of Governor Worth. Among them were Mrs. E. E. Moffitt, of Richmond, Va., and Mrs. Adelaide Worth Bagley, of Washington, D. C., daughters of the governor; Josephine Daniels and Mrs. Daniels, Jonathan Worth Daniels, named for Governor Worth, and others. Two sons of H. M. London, himself a descendant of the governor, were the great-great-grandchildren present.

GREAT PROGRESS MADE BY THE RAILROADS IN YEAR OF 1922

New York, Jan. 3.—Railroads of the United States made more progress in 1922 than in any other year since the outbreak of the world war, according to a review made public today by the committee on public relations of the eastern railroads, of which E. E. Loomis, president of the Lehigh Valley railroad, is chairman. Summarizing its conclusion the committee stated that the year was marked by the greatest traffic yet known; the highest degree of operating efficiency yet achieved; the greatest increase in new facilities for the past ten years; the beginning of substantial new construction after a lapse

of almost eight years; improved co-operation with shippers and by substantial improvement in earnings and in labor and public relations.

While figures for December were not available when the review was prepared, the committee estimated that car loadings for 1922 would amount to nearly 50 million cars as compared with the previous record of 45 million in 1920.

"In the course of the greatest traffic yet offered," it was stated, "the railroads succeeded in turning a car shortage into car surplus. They also handled the country's peak load of traffic without delay."
