The general prosperity of the last two years has been immeasurably heightened by the efficient handling of freight, lately more than a million cars a week; this quick transportation making possible a fast turnover of commodities, more sales, and consequently more money in circulation. It has contributed to liquid credit, thus making it easier to do business; and has resulted in better collection by reason of quick deliveries.

The Continental and Commercial Bank of Chicago, in its bulletin of November says: "Fears of Fall freight congestion that were voiced in the past have proved entirely unfounded. Moreover, the efficient handling of freight has helped the keep credit liquid by making turnover more rapid. Bank credit has not been tied up or frozen thru traffic congestion. The railroads have not been and will not be a drag on business. If they are not hampered by radical legislation, they will help business both by moving goods efficiently and by continuing to place equipment orders."

These facts in no uncertain terms speak for themselves "Credit to whom credit is due."
