

IMPORTANT SOUTHERN CROP

Under the above caption we issued a letter last September urging that care be used in buying seed with which to grow this season's crop, to learn something of the history of the seed, as good seed is one of the determining factors in the production of maximum crops of potatoes.

Assuming that a large number of growers in Virginia and the Carolinas have bought certified or quality seed and have selected and properly prepared their land, let us give some consideration to the market demands and to some of the important steps to be taken in growing and preparing potatoes for the early market.

The market season for the early districts last only a few weeks, and frequently the volume of shipments going to the markets during this period is so large that the buyers can afford to be choice in their purchases.

To obtain the best prices and to secure repeat orders market demands and preferences should be heeded. Dealers and consumers do not desire badly cut, mangled, frosted and decayed potatoes or those damaged by sun-burn, blight, dry rot, or an excess of soil or second growth.

See Treatment

Seed potatoes no matter what their source may be or how clean they may look, should be treated with corrosive sublimate or formaldehyde before planting in order to kill all disease organisms that may be harbored on the surface of the potatoes.

Seed treatment will control such diseases as "Scab", "Black Leg", "Scurf", and to a slight extent "Rhizoctonia". It will make a healthier plant; give you a clean crop, and produce a slight increase in yield.

WILLIAMSTON BOY NOW HOLDS RESPONSIBLE POSITION WITH INDEMNITY CO.

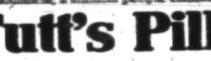
