#### POLICE TO ENFORCE MR. BRANDON AUTOMOBILE LAWS FACTS ON GOOD SEED

Nothing can be more important righ now than getting good seed, especially with coston and corn.

In 1923 cotton variety test it is shown that there is a variation of several hundred pourtls of seed cotton per acre. These seed were selec ed from breeders of differe t varieties and supposed to be pure seed.

Cotton variety tests are conducted or the purpose of furnishing growers of the state with information regardng varieties best suited to their section. Since there are several hundred amed varieties of cotton it would be mpossible for a single grower to test hem all and quite expensive for him to test a small part of them, for this, reason the experiment station collects eed of the most promising varieties and compares their yield and quality

The best varieties from this and other states have been included inthese tests during the past fifteen years. During this time the best yielding and most u iform a nieties have een recommended to give ers of the

In many cases these verie ies have ielded from ten to thirt dollars more er acre than the ones a ually grown, When a 'armer buys good seed he hould select them every year in coder keep up a good yield

The cotion from which the seed are o be taken should be gir ed separate. y and the seed reclea ed and the faulty and black one removed.

Black see I have no lint on them and when ylanted they come up six or even days earlier than the o'hers. When you chop your cetten out the talks are much larger and are saved ov the hands on that zecou t. That is why seed get so many black ores aamong them when not reclea ed and bread up.
